What is Bullying?

In general, bullying has all the following components:

Hurting someone repeatedly

For an incident to be considered bullying, a person has bullied the same student(s) more than once.

Using power over another

The bully has the power while the person being bullied does not feel that they can do anything about it or make it stop. Bullying is not conflict, where both involved have equal power.

Being mean on purpose

A student who bullies is trying to intentionally hurt the student he or she is bullying in some way, even after they have been told to stop.




Bullying is:

What Parents Should Know



A Closer Look at Bullying

Physical Bullying is usually the easiest type to spot. It can includes:

- Hitting, kicking, scratching, shoving, or tripping
- Taking items such as money or food
- Damaging belongings

Verbal Bullying is the most common type. It can include:

- Teasing and taunting
- Name calling
- Spreading rumors

Social Exclusion can be subtle. It can include:

- Ignoring or excluding on purpose
- Nasty looks

Cyberbullying uses different types of digital technologies. It can include:

- Sending cruel emails, text or instant messages
- Threatening others in an online chat room
- Creating websites meant to damage reputations
- Circulating or posting photos taken from a cell camera without permission

What To Do If Your Child Is Being Bullied

- First, focus on your child. Be supportive and gather information about the bullying (who, what, where, when). If bullying is done electronically, save the evidence, block the person making the mean comments, and do not reply.
- Contact your child's teacher or principal. He or she will probably be in the best position to understand the relationships between your child and other peers at school.
- If you know your child is being bullied, report it immediately so schools can begin their investigation.
